BODS have had another active and successful year. We have a stable and loyal membership and we continue to offer the community opportunities to participate in staged productions within a warm and friendly environment. We have attracted new members during 2023 and we always welcome new enquiries for on stage and off-stageroles.

We successfully delivered our usual TWO productions at the Betchworth Village WarHallin 2023. The first was in May when we whisked ourselves away to the luxurious paddle steamerThe Lotus. We all enjoyed dressing up in 1940's glamour and creating a bit of intrigueand mystery in the wonderful 'Murder on the Nile' by Agatha Christie.

This is one of the few plays that Agatha Christie adapted for the stage herself and, unlike all the well-known film versions, the detective in the stage play is not the famous

Hercule Poirot but rather a Church Canon by the name of Pennefather. It was said that she was bored of Poirot and wanted to introduce a new character!

In November we staged The Matchgirls a musical written by Bill Owen (Last of the Summer Wine) with music by Tony Russell.

The show tells the story of the girls and women from the Bryant and May Match Factory in Bow, London in 1888. Fed up with appalling working conditions, bullying and serious risks to their health, they decided to walk out on strike.

After several months of hardship, they were successful in improving their conditions and as a result the Matchgirls were instrumental in forming the largest union for women and girls in the country and this resulted in a wave of collective organising amongst industrial workers.

A curious subject matter for a musical perhaps, but with good characters, good music, and uplifting humorous touches amidst a serious and important story, it was another excellent and well received show. We also enjoyed a wonderful quiz night in the hall and raised some important funds to help us continue to produce our shows.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Village Hall for all their support through the years and to the community for continuing to support our productions.

We look forward to welcoming you again this May, for a trip to Italy in an adaptation of Elizabeth von Arnim's book, The Enchanted April.

The magazine is delivered to every house in the village by an invaluable team of 32 people headed by Susie Redburn. Articles for the magazine now arrive exclusively by email to <u>betchworthmag@hotmail.com</u>. We also will publish appropriate small ads from parishioners at a nominal cost for a limited number of issues, proceeds going to church funds. There is still a waiting list for commercial advertisers, which is always a good thing.

Our editors, Ros Rokison, Sian Winter and Tim Warren have the task of collating, editing and sometimes retyping all the various articles, putting everything into the correct format and font. Recently we have been joined by Chris Humphreys who helped us out when Sian Winter became ill. Chris has stayed with us and Sian has thankfully now recovered. This has been a great help.

The articles are then numbered in the correct appropriate order before sending them to the Desk Top Publishers. Their job is to put them all into the magazine template. This is a lengthy process as articles have to fit exactly into the correct number of pages and we try where possible not split articles over the page. This work is done by Ros Rokison, Alison Higgins, and John Scotcher. The DTP team has now been joined by Tim Warren, but we have heard recently that having reached the grand age of 80 John Scotcher is stepping down. We thank him for all his years of volunteering and wish him well.

The magazine continues to be very professional in its construction and production.

Buckland & Betchworth Choral Society - Update 2023 - 2024

Last April's music for the Leith Hill Music Festival was Handel's Zadok the Priest, Cecilia McDowell's Laudate and the Haydn Nelson Mass, which we sang with the choirs of Beare Green and Newdigate, Holmbury St. Mary, Bookham, Horsley and Mickleham.

Our pieces for the morning competition were; Wide Open Spaces by Sarah Quartel, In these Delightful Pleasant Groves by Henry Purcell and If Ye Love Me by Thomas Tallis.

We entered one group for the ensemble class, singing The Hills by John Ireland and were delighted to win not only the Arthur Lawrence Cup but also the Julian Armitage Smith Plate for the highest score over the whole two-day competition.

In the summer term we put on a Madrigal Sing Day at St. Michael's Betchworth with an informal performance plus afternoon tea with a glass of fizz. It was very well received, especially as it was a beautiful summer day.

Our November concert was a celebration of our centenary, and we booked St. John's Church in Redhill for the larger space. We had a small orchestra and two soloists and sang; two Handel Coronation anthems, the Vivaldi Gloria, Eleanor Daley's O Ye who Taste that Love is Sweet and Howard Goodall's Love Divine. We also reprised the ensemble performance of John Ireland's The Hills. The retiring collection was for The British Legion.

Our usual December Carol Concert took place at St Michael's, Betchworth.

Both of these concerts were very well attended by locals and families and friends of the singers. The Carol Concert raised over £800 for The Children's Trust at Tadworth. We are very grateful for all the local support.

The Choral Society is currently deep in rehearsals for this year's Leith Hill Music Festival. We are singing Lauridson's Lux Aeterna and Puccini's Messa di Gloria at 7.30 on Saturday 13th April at Dorking Halls. We would be very happy to see local people in the audience at the concert.

Our Wednesday evening rehearsals at the Village Hall are great fun. Singing is good for you and provides the opportunity to meet new people. The choir is non-auditioned and very welcoming to newcomers. Our brand new conductor, George Inscoe, is very encouraging and we are ably accompanied by Anna Tetsuya on the piano. We hold several social events during the year including a quiz night. Once a month we go down to the Red Lion post rehearsals and on Festival days we have a choir lunch at a Dorking restaurant to celebrate the fact the competitions are finished for the day, and any successes achieved.

This summer term we are planning to hold an afternoon concert at St. Michael's Betchworth accompanied by a jazz trio of piano, drums and double bass, followed by tea and 'fizz'.

Update for Poland Trust 2023

Progress for 2023

- The last of the 12 Almhouses at Poland Meadow was occupied at the beginning of 2023.
- All of the occupiers have settled in very well and a community is being formed. For many occupiers having their own home has been a life changing experience.
- In June at the Almhouse Association AGM in June 2023. The Trust were presented with an award for Inspirational Homes. We were delighted to receive that award.

Plans for 2024

- Due to the difficult weather conditions in 2023, either to wet or to dry, and a contractual issue, we were notable to complete the landscaping at Poland Meadow but will be doing so this spring.
- During 2023 The Trust were approached by the Trustees of Anthony West House in Brockham, (the old vicarage) to consider whether The Trust would accept a merger between the Trust and AWH. This is due to be completed this year and the Trust has already taken over the management of AWH.
- As a result The Trust now has 36 homes in Poland House, Anthony West House and Poland Meadow for local people only. The former two are for more elderly people whilst the latter is for younger people. All potential occupant's must be in need, hardship or distress. The area of benefit is firstly Brockham, and then Betchworth, Buckland and Leigh (except for Poland Meadow which is actually in Betchworth so applicants for vacancies from Betchworth and Brockham are given equal weight). Three homes at AWH have recently become vacant and two of successful applicants were from Betchworth.
